Note: a) BIOGRAPHY: Raised in Pittsburgh's Homewood section, at 314 North Homewood Avenue, he graduated from Sterrit School, Point Breeze. His father died of pneumonia in 1909, just before he enrolled at Shady Side Academy. He went on to Princeton University and graduated Phi Beta Kappa in 1917 with a degree in classics, planning to study law. He joined the U.S. Army and served with the Coastal Artillery Corps at Fortress Monroe, Virginia before being sent to France with large railway guns. He was a First Lieutenant with the 5th Tng. Co., enlisted 25 August 1917, and discharged 25 January 1919. After the war he returned to Pittsburgh to help his mother manage the William T. Leggett Company. BIOGRAPHY: On 12 September 1925, in Washington, D.C. at the Metropolitan Methodist Episcopal Church, he married Lucile McKee Showalter, Methodist daughter of former Congressman Joseph Baltzell Showalter and Ella Marian McKee. The ceremony was witnessed only by the respective families, with a luncheon following at the Mayflower Hotel. The newlyweds took the train to New York, where they stayed for a few days in the Roosevelt Hotel, no doubt paying calls on Leggett relatives, both those who had, and those who had not, been able to attend the wedding in Washington. They had tickets for the S. S. Sixaola, of the United Fruit Company Steamship Service, sailing for Kingston, Jamaica at 11 a.m. on 16 September, from Pier 9 North River. While in Jamaica, they stayed in the Myrtle Bank Hotel in Kingston, also owned and operated by the United Fruit Company. We have a photo album and scrapbook, embossed "Our Book of Memories--Milton and Lucile Leggett" which contains many pictures and other remembrances of their courtship, honeymoon and married life through about 1960. BIOGRAPHY: Returning from their honeymoon, they lived for a short time at 605A Worth Street, Squirrel Hill, Pittsburgh. Milton is seen posing before the front door in his army uniform on Memorial Day, 1926. They were living there upon the birth of their first child, Elizabeth Ann, on 16 February 1927. Shortly thereafter, in May, 1927, they moved to larger quarters at 6521 Dalzell Place. Their second child, John Milton, arrived on 22 January 1931. In 1932, they moved to the northern edge of Allegheny County, to Bradford Woods Boro. During the family's nine-year residency there, he served on the Boro Council, and the children attended elementary school in a two-room school

house. They rented a house at 800 Narcissus Street, Clearwater Beach, Florida, during the summer of 1941. Lucile's mother and her only surviving brother, Joseph, had moved from Washington, D.C. and were by that time residents of Tampa. Lucile was still in Clearwater Beach in September 1941, when Milton sent a telegram from Pittsburgh commemorating their 16th anniversary and announcing the signing of the purchase agreement for their first house. So they returned to Squirrel Hill, at 6632 Ridgeville Street, primarily so Liz could attend Winchester-Thurston School. They lived in Ridgeville Street until 1960, when they moved to a new house of their own design at 121 Hartwood Drive, Point Breeze.

n BIOGRAPHY: During all these years, they attended Calvary Episcopal Church, Pittsburgh. At Calvary Church he had been a choir boy, and as a young man was an organizer of the Junior Vestry which did Sunday morning ushering. Later he served as a vestryman of this venerable parish, working for many years as an Every Member Canvasser.

n BIOGRAPHY: As President of the William T. Leggett Co., Inc., Milton oversaw the expansion of the firm and the rapid postwar changes in the wholesale building supply business. He replaced heavy tonnage, low profit inventory such as sewer pipe, cement and slate roofing with aluminum windows and siding and all kinds of kitchen and bathroom fixtures and appliances. He moved the firm from the Strip District to the Bloomfield property on the PRR mainline at 615 Gross Street, and, in the late 1960's, to the present location next to the 40th Street Bridge in Lawrenceville. His plan to sell the business to his employees was carried out by his sister Helen Corbett and his son John.

n BIOGRAPHY: A man with true Renaissance interests, Milton read widely, loved to hike and tour the back roads and historic sites of the U.S.A. and Canada. He had an amazing ability to relate easily to persons of all backgrounds; he took a genuine and compassionate interest in all whom he met. He enjoyed painting and photography, and he delighted Pittsburgh audiences with his antique "magic lantern" shows. A favorite spot in the backyard garden was his wildflower bed.

n BIOGRAPHY: Milton died of cancer at Columbia Hospital in July 1970. Not long after, Lucile gave up the house she had overseen the design and construction of only a decade earlier. She moved into an apartment in Oakland, near to where her sister-in-law, Helen Corbett, lived after the old family home at 314 Homewood Avenue was sold to Rockwell Manufacturing Co. and torn down.

I have believed from my earliest recollection that woman was the equal of man in many attributes of character and his superior in some. In fact, I believe in the equality of the sexes, in the principles of Christianity as applied to humanity and exemplified in the teaching and practice of the golden rule, in the Declaration of Independence as framed by the immortal Jefferson wherein he declares that all men are created equal and endowed by their Creator with certain

inalienable rights among which are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. I doubt not but these fundamental principles are accepted by the great majority of intelligent Americans. Still there are many who doubt the propriety of woman entering the professions while yielding consent to the argument that she has the right to do so--the right to earn her livelihood in any honest avocation in which the God of nature may have endowed her with abilities to pursue. Who, oh man, shall be the Judge as to the propriety? Thanks to an enlightened public conscience and the steady progressive spirit of the age, the high walls of prejudice, superstition and ignorance have been broken in many places, if not entirely leveled, and today we can point to many illustrious examples wherein our noble profession has been honored and elevated, a community benefitted and blessed, and many a house made happy by the faithful intelligent demonstrations of a woman physician whose efforts for the amelioration of the sufferings of others have won for her imperishable tablets in the temple of humanity. To those who doubt the propriety of women entering the professions, I would remind them that women have exercised the highest civil powers in all ages of the world, from Zenobia of Palmyra to Victoria of England, and without detracting from their graces as women or their virtues as mothers. That women have created public sentiment before which legislatures have bowed and courts have bowed. "God grant that the day may soon arrive when we shall not only accord them the right of equal pay for equal work in any and all pursuits to which they may aspire and in which they may prove themselves equipped, but also when our enlightened nation shall grant them the recognition of their capacity for full citizenship."

BIOGRAPHY: It is the belief of many wise men of our times that there is a crisis at hand in the affairs of government. That in the great gulf stream of humanity which flows from foreign shores with increasing and rising flood, the integrity of our nation is at hazard, and unrestricted immigration is the mother of public demoralization, socialism, and anarchy. The only cure is restricted immigration and universal suffrage limited only by an educational qualification. I believe the cure will be more permanent than the one effected by the Erie physician of whom my friend Sen. McClure relates that he had acquired quite a reputation in the treatment of stuttering. One morning, a patient entered his office and enquired, "Can you cure stuttering?" "Yes sir"--just then a young man in the office desirous of sharing the doctor's skill exclaimed, "He cured me!"

BIOGRAPHY: Dr. Joseph B. Showalter, aged 81, former congressman from the Butler district, who died at his home in Washington, D. C., Saturday, was buried in the North Cemetery in Butler at 11 o'clock this morning. Both his widow, and a daughter, Mrs. A. W. McCandless of Pittsburgh are seriously ill at their homes and were unable to accompany the body to Butler.

BIOGRAPHY: Dr. Showalter died suddenly in Washington Saturday of a cerebral hemorrhage.

BIOGRAPHY: He was born in Fayette county, February 11, 1851, the son of Levi and Elizabeth Showalter. He obtained his education in the public schools and at George's Creek Academy at Smithfield.

BIOGRAPHY: When 16 years of age, he started teaching in Preston county, West Virginia, and followed this vocation in West Virginia, Indiana and Illinois.

BIOGRAPHY: In 1873 he came to Chicora and in company with his brothers began operating in the Millerstown oil field, striking his first well on Christmas Day, 1873. He continued to be active in the oil industry, and the Showalter Brothers became one of the largest producing organizations in the state.

BIOGRAPHY: While teaching he began reading medicine and spent the year of 1883 at Long Island college hospital, Brooklyn, New York. He later entered the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Baltimore, Md., where he was graduated March 4, 1884.

BIOGRAPHY: He returned to Chicora and started practicing, and continued his professional duties for six years, retiring from practice in 1890. In 1886 he was elected on the Republican ticket to the legislature and during his term was a member of the committee on constitutional reform. In 1888 he was elected to the state senate. He was

nBIOGRAPHY: Funeral services will be held at 10 a.m. tomorrow at the residence. Burial will be in Waynesboro, Va.

nBIOGRAPHY: Born in Dale Enterprise, Va., Dr. Showalter was educated at the West Central Academy and Bridgewater College. He later received honorary doctor degrees from Pennsylvania College and Bridgewater.

nBIOGRAPHY: Became Writer in 1898.

nBIOGRAPHY: After two years of teaching in the Virginia schools, Dr. Showalter began his newspaper career in 1898. He came to Washington in 1901 and worked for a variety of newspapers and bureaus as reporter, special writer and editor. He served as correspondent in South America and the Canal Zone and was considered one of the outstanding writers on the progress of the Panama Canal.

nBIOGRAPHY: He joined the editorial staff of the National Geographic Society in 1914 and specialized in writing popular presentations of scientific and technical subjects. He was the author of "America's Amazing Railway Traffic," "Battling With Panama Slides," "Coal's Ally of American Industry," "Exploring the Mysteries of Plant Life," "Interviewing the Stars," "Virginia's A Commonwealth That Has Come Back," and many other articles in the National Geographic Magazine.

nBIOGRAPHY: He was decorated in 1912 by the Venezuelan government with the Order of Bolivar.
