Note: ^{a)} Notes from Dorothy Michalitschka: My father was born in Anselmo, Nebraska, USA. The next year the family came to Alberta for the cheap land \$10. for 160 acres. My Grandfather named the area Anselmo after their old home, so they could have mail service. He was the first Postmaster and got the mail at the closest railway stop. He rode horseback for the mail until a road was made so he could take his wagon and bring back supplies for the homesteaders.
